"Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. I have not come to call the righteous but sinners to repentance." (Luke 5:31) These words were spoken in the context of a dinner party held by Levi, the tax collector, who responded personally to Jesus' to follow Him. And now, having been converted, in his great joy, Luke tells us that Levi invites Jesus to have dinner with a group of his fellow tax collectors in his home. Tax collectors, in those days, were considered to be traitors for with the Romans by collecting taxes from their own people on behalf of their oppressors. They were notorious for _____ and intimidation, for charging extra and keeping some for themselves. Their handling of Roman currency also made them ceremonially , which cut them off from the synagogue, which was the centre of Jewish community life. This was seen as by the Scribes and Pharisees, who were horrified that Jesus would not only enter the home of a tax collector, but also break bread with sinners. Jesus responds to this criticism by explaining His in coming into the world in the first place Christmas happened so that Jesus could call sinners to . .

The whole passage is building to the invitation in verse 32 that, as it turns out, actually describes the very reason for Jesus' birth on that first Christmas morning, "I have not come to call the righteous but sinners to repentance."
