For John to call the Jews to be baptized, in a way designed for non-believers, would have been shocking and at the time. To confess that they were no better than Gentiles was, for many Jews, undignified and

WHY JESUS CAME TO BE BAPTIZED

"Then Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan, to be baptized by him. John	
would have prevented him, saying, 'I need to be baptized by you, and do you come	
to me?' But Jesus answered him, 'Let it be so now; for it is proper for us in this way	

to fulfill all righteousness." (Matthew 3:13-15)

the Lord to receive a baptism designed for sinners.		
John's attitude to Jesus was the exactof his response to the religious leaders of the day. He publically confronted their and commanded them to He refused to baptize them on account of		
their, duplicity, and impenitence.		
Jesus doesn't John's assessment of His sinless perfection, and answers John's objections by explaining that His baptism was and proper, so that He might fulfil all the requirements of God. It was God's will for John to baptize the people; and because Jesus perfectly		
to the will of God in everything, it was fitting for Him to also receive the baptism of John.		
"Since, then, we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is <u>unable to sympathize with our weaknesses</u> , but we have one who in every respect <u>has been tested as we are, yet without sin</u> ." (Hebrews 4:14-16)
